






PENDING SURVEYS 2

- More explanation on the entire course and what is due and when and the formatting of how to turn assignments in.
- . A lot of times on discussion posts and journals I would loose points for things that I didn't feel as though I should have lost points for. A lot of the times your comments would be extremely vague and unhelpful. Most of the time I got something along the lines of "your response was absolutely correct and showed a clear understanding of the material, but the last sentence was too much so you lost a point here" or "great response, but it was too long so you lost a point", which frustrated me because it made it seem like this was a writing course instead of a philosophy course. Another thing I really disliked was the fact that you used the same bblearn page and syllabus from previous quarters, which made some of the information inaccurate or incorrect, which was also frustrating.
- Can't think of any at the moment, the class helped me look at the Republic from an introspective point of view.
- . Having undergone the course doing one journal assignment a week, I would advocate for this routine to stay in place of more formal essays. I found splitting up the work into easy to digest sections made the whole of the readings more comprehensible. Additionally, this focusing and compartmentalizing of work made it easier to express my separate thoughts into a writing format.
